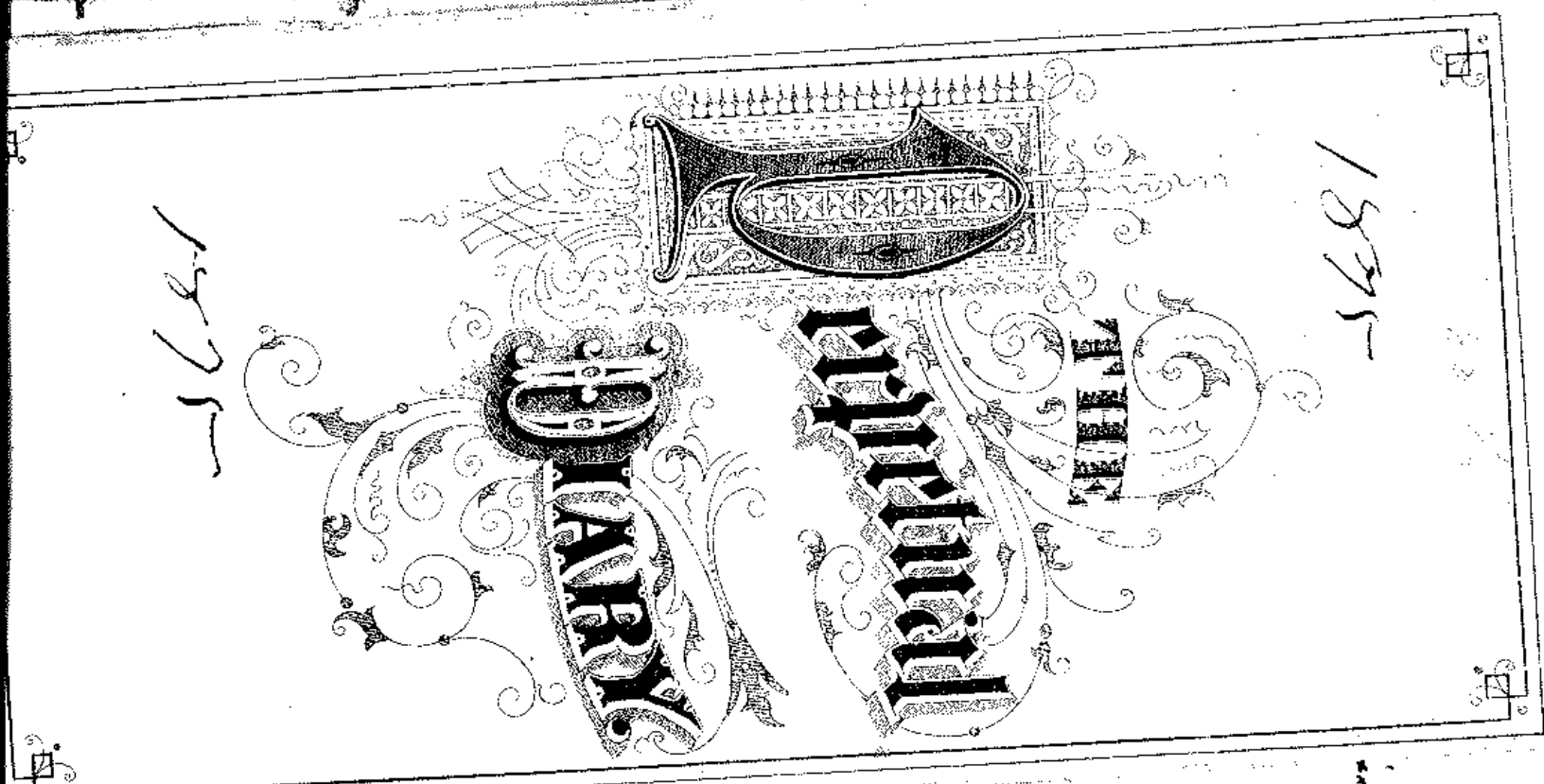

At 2 in the morning I suffered with severe chills & left my bed and walked to the store in a few moments - a good fire was in full blaze - I used warm flannel & hung in thirty minutes I was in some degree comfortable - the shock came near freezing fatal - The sun shines to day but I dare not venture out 10° below M  
no person in the street to day but near sunset some of the neighbors were breaking through the snow drifts 18° below 9 P.M.
